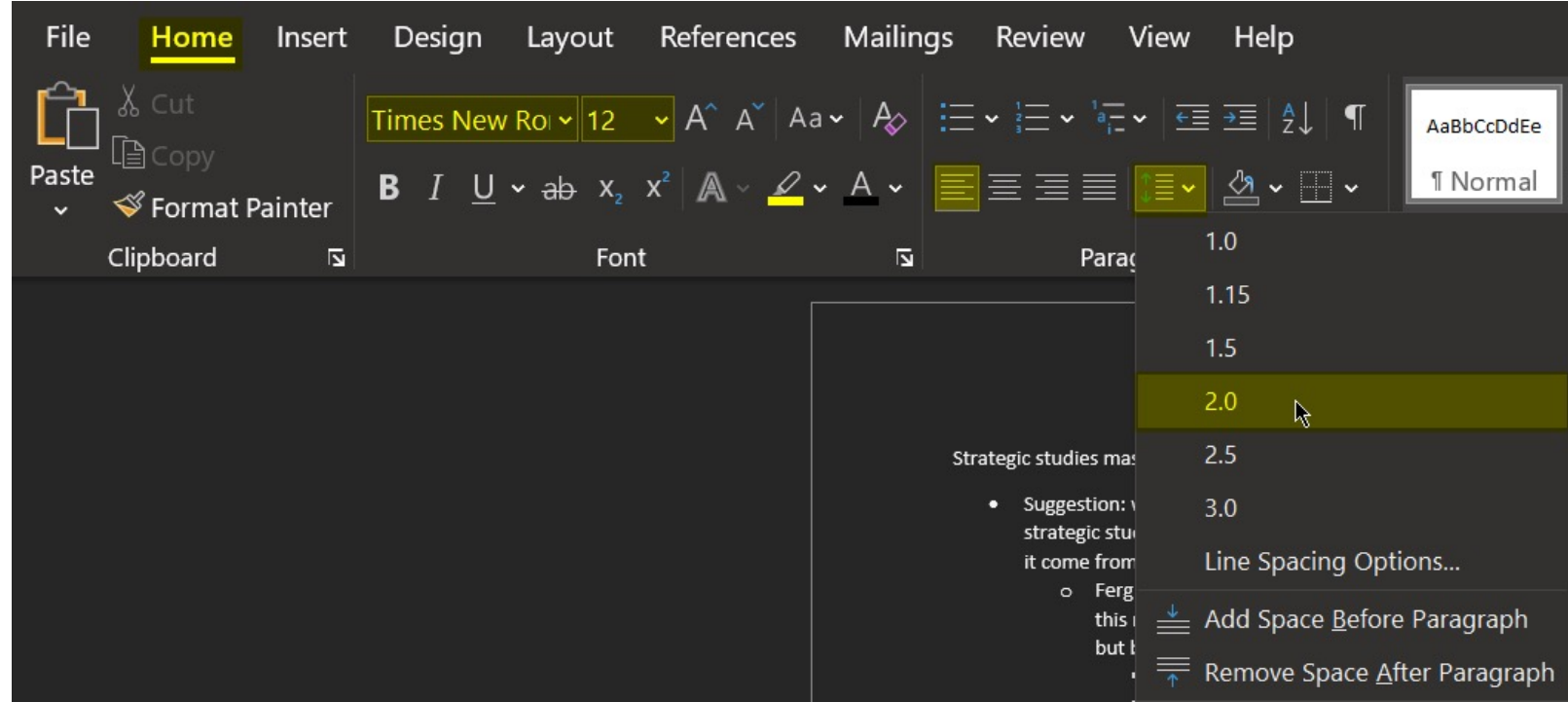

TITLE PAGE

- The title can either be on a separate page or included on the first page of your assignment
- If included on the first page:
 - The title should be centered at the top of the first page of text
 - Student number, Course information, Instructor's name, and date is placed in the header of the page
- If on a separate page:
 - The title should be centered one third down from the top of the page
 - List your name, student number, course information, and date on separate lines near the bottom of the title page.
 - Double space each line of the title page

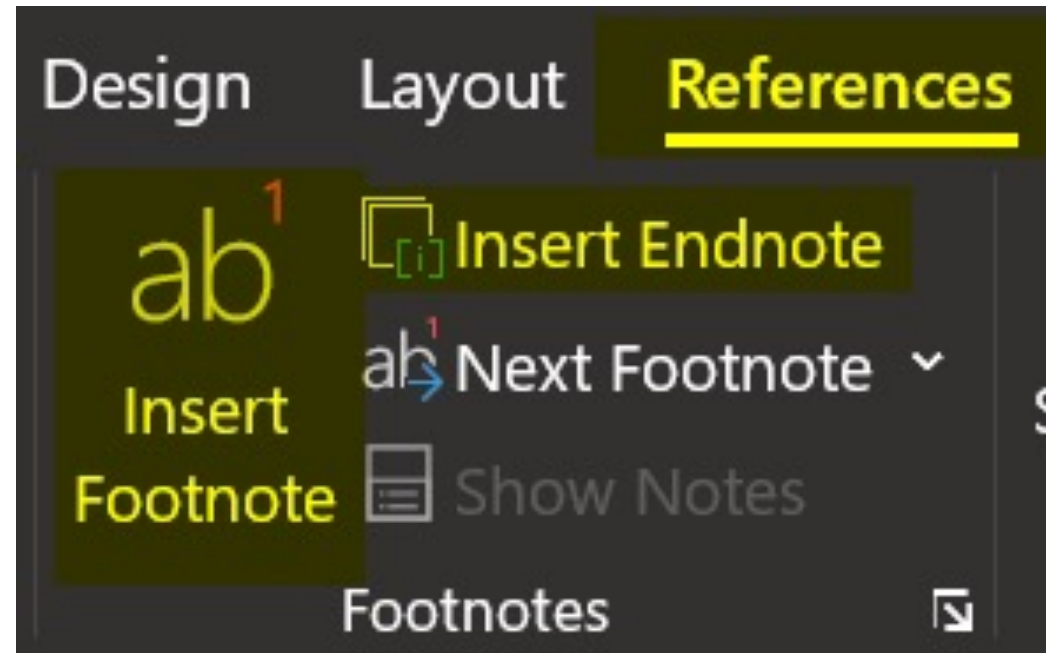
THE BODY OF YOUR TEXT

- The body of your text should be double spaced
- The font should be readable (we recommend Times New Roman)
- The font size of 12 pt.
- **NOTE: your professor will likely have their own preferences listed in the assignment outline – use that first!**



IN-TEXT CITATIONS: NOTES AND BIBLIOGRAPHY

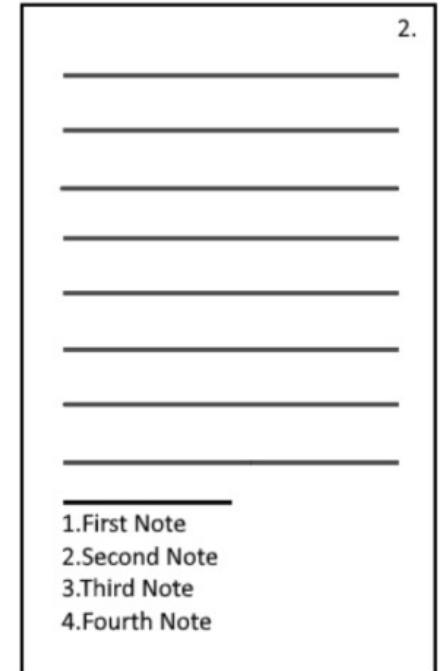
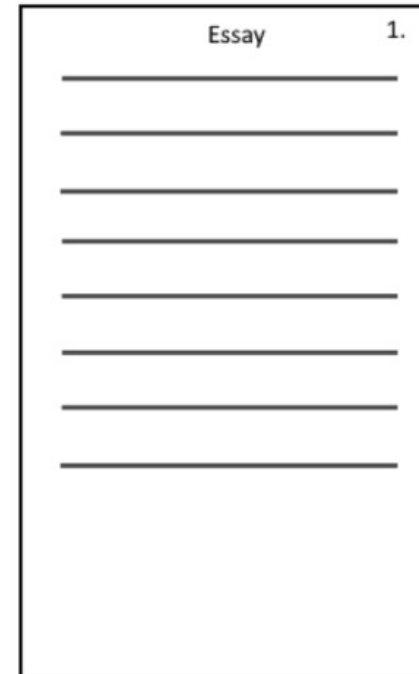
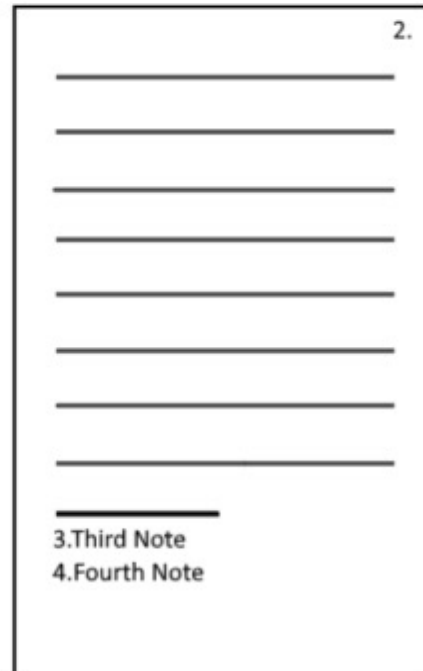
- Chicago uses in-text citation when citing any ideas that are not yours
- When citing, each idea is given a superscripted number at the end of the clause, sentence, or punctuation
- This superscripted number then refers the reader to either the:
 - Footnotes
 - Endnotes



FOOTNOTES VS ENDNOTES

In **footnote citations**, superscripts number and the cited material's information can be easily located on the same page

In **endnote citations**, superscripts number and the cited material's information are located on a separate page



FOOTNOTE AND ENDNOTE EXAMPLES

Notes format for books

Author A's First name Last name, and Author B's First name Last name, *Title of work: Subtitle*, (Location of Publication: Publisher Name, Year of publication), page(s) of cited idea. DOI (if available)

Example:

1. **Lukas K. Danner**, *China's Grand Strategy: Contradictory Foreign Policy?* (Cham: Palgrave MacMillan, 2018), 5-6. <https://doi.org/10.1007/978-3-319-65777-6>.
2. **Danner**, *China's Grand Strategy*, 5-6.

Notes format for chapter in an edited book

Author A's First name Last name, and Author B's First name Last name, "Chapter," In *Title of Book*, ed. Editor's name. (Location of Publication: Publisher Name, Year of publication), page(s) of cited idea. DOI (if available)

Example:

1. **Charles Taylor**, "The Philosophy of the Social Sciences," in *Political Theory and Political Education*, ed. Melvin Richter, (New Jersey: Princeton University Press, 2014), 79-80.
2. **Taylor**, "Philosophy of the Social Sciences," 79-80.

FOOTNOTE AND ENDNOTE EXAMPLES

Notes format for academic journals

Author A's First name Last Name, and Author B's First name Last name, "Title of article," *Title of Periodical* volume number, no. issue number (month or season of publication Year of publication): page(s) of cited idea, DOI (if available).

Example:

1. Iasiello Emilio, "China's Three Warfares Strategy Mitigates Fallout From Cyber Espionage Activities," *Journal of Strategic Security* 9, no. 2 (Summer 2016): 55-56. <http://dx.doi.org/10.5038/1944-0472.9.2.1489>.
2. Emilio, "China's Three Warfares Strategy," 55-56.

Notes format for online webpages

"Title of page," Title of the whole websites, Site owner or sponsor, Updated Year updated/posted, Accessed date accessed. URL

Example:

1. "History of the ICRC," International Committee of the Red Cross, ICRC, Updated October 29, 2016, Accessed August 20, 2021. <https://www.icrc.org/en/document/history-icrc>.

FOOTNOTE AND ENDNOTE EXAMPLES

Notes format for a tweet

First name Last name or organization name (@username),
“Content of the post,” Site Name, Date of tweet, Time of
tweet, URL.

Example:

The latest report from the @IPCC_CH illustrates why every country must increase their climate ambition and action in the coming decade.” Twitter, August 9, 2021, 7:45 a.m.

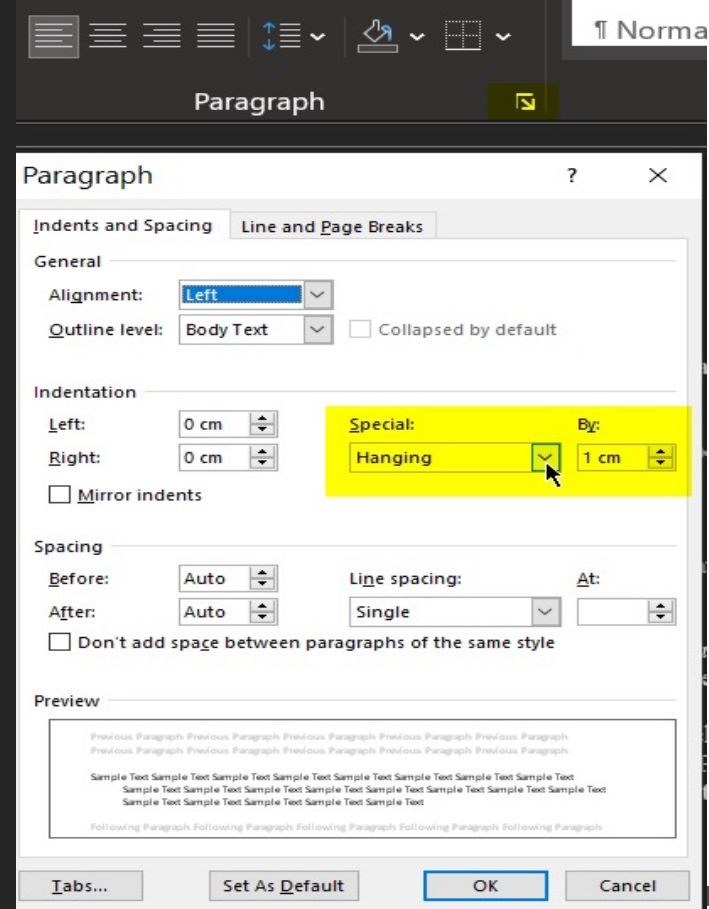

BIBLIOGRAPHY

- Start on a separate page and put “Bibliography” centered and bolded at the top of the page.
- References should be listed alphabetically by last name of author or organization name, and if the reference continues to a second line a hanging indentation should be used (example 2: Highlight all > Home > Paragraph > special)
- For citations with multiple authors, the first author’s name is listed last name then first name. Then all the following authors are listed first name then last name.
- All “footnote” or “endnotes” citations must have corresponding references and vice-versa
- If an electronic book or journal article is used include a doi or permalink in the citation
- If a webpage is used, include a link in the citation

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Example:

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Bibliography format for chapter in an edited book

Author A's Last Name, First name, and Author B's First name Last name. "Chapter." In, *Title of Book*, edited by Editor's name, pages of the chapter. Location of Publication: Publisher Name. Year of publication. DOI (if available)
